As the founder of the Center for Advanced Mental Health Practice (CAMHP) Foundation, she has championed economic stability and social capital as crucial elements of mental well-being. With a Doctorate in Social Work from Tulane University, her research has focused on poverty, food insecurity, economic sovereignty, and the psychological roots of domestic violence recovery.

Her career includes high-level experience in clinical supervision, federal reentry programs, military family therapy, and emergency child welfare intervention. Dr. Dronet has developed psychoanalytically informed training programs for social workers in military, forensic, and community settings, ensuring that therapists are well-versed in both traditional and cutting-edge psychodynamic approaches.

• Advanced Clinical Case Managers to refine their ability to oversee complex cases that require both psychotherapy and resource coordination.
